# Attention Brothers - Council Going "Green"

The Council would like all brothers who have a computer and internet access to get their newsletters electronically. Brothers who do not have a computer will still be able to get a hard copy of the newsletter mailed to them.

When I started as newsletter chairman in 1996 it cost the Council roughly \$70.00 to print and \$30.00 to mail the newsletter each month. In September it cost the Council \$186.69 to print and mail the newsletter. Currently it costs \$0.40 to print and between \$0.284 and \$0.352 to bulk mail each newsletter. With the Council's membership growing this cost can only go up. The Council cannot afford this expense every month. The yearly cost is approximately \$3,000.00. Wouldn't it be better to spend some of that money on charitable causes?

By the end of 2010 all Council members will have to inform me either by regular mail, e-mail or telephone how they would like to receive their newsletter. Newsletters will not be mailed to members who don't respond to this request.

The Council's website (<u>www.kofc6100.org</u>) has a link that shows the latest monthly newsletter in pdf format. The newest newsletter will be posted on the website by the first weekend of the month. If you provide your e-mail, you will receive a reminder when the new newsletter is posted.

# **Grand Knight's Report**

Brothers all,

Last month I asked you why you joined the Knights and invited you to contribute your talents to making life a little better for someone in need. In today's letter, I would like to remind you of one benefit available to help you. Our Council has set up a Brother-In-Need program that is designed to provide assistance to any Brother, whether it be financial or another type of help. The program can be totally confidential. Just contact the Grand Knight. Together, we can discuss the situation and possible solutions. Remember, we are here for each other.

A quick update on our financials... the trustees have successfully completed the biannual audit and our accounts are in order. Our income and spending are at about the same rate as the last audit. I was a little worried about how the audit would go since we've updated our Quickbooks procedures, but everything went smoothly. Special thanks go out to Chip Leiher and Guy Tarsitano for making sure all the accounts were in order. If you would like to see the report, it will be available at the next business meeting.

September was Rick Banchansky's last month leading the bingo set-up team. Rick has led the team for over a year and has made sure that the hall is setup every week. Thank you Rick!

Speaking of bingo, I am sure that you have heard that we need more help. Currently, we have a setup crew that works every week, there are 4 teams that have about 5 guys each, 4 guys who work bingo every week and a few others who work a couple of times a month. I thank them for their dedication; bingo is successful because of them! It may sound like there is plenty of help, but we are in a very precarious position. Some workers can't make it by 6:00pm on Fridays, not all team members make it on their scheduled day, and very often, captains are left to get help at the last minute. As a result, bingo is suffering. We sometimes start late, have long lines at the register, or don't sell a lot of pull tabs. Working shorthanded affects the players. And the workers are getting frustrated.

We need everyone's help. If we cannot continue Bingo, we cannot continue to spend. It's that simple. Today, I am asking anyone who is not working Bingo in some way to contact me or the deputy. We can find a way for you to help, no matter what your schedule is. We are in particular need of brothers that can help open at 6:00pm. Even if you can only stay for an hour or so, it would be a great help. I'm asking just an hour or so, once a month.

# Senator Lautenberg's Amendment Would Permanently Support Tax-Funded Abortion Abroad

Washington, DC (LifeNews.com) – Late Friday, August 6<sup>th</sup>, pro-abortion Sen. Frank Lautenberg slipped an amendment into the foreign appropriations bill that would make permanent President Barack Obama's overturning of the Mexico City Policy. That's the rule that stops tax dollars from going to groups that promote and perform abortions overseas. In January, Obama overturned the policy during his first week in office and opened the door to abortion businesses like Planned Parenthood receiving a share of \$457 million designed to help impoverished nations. The Appropriations Committee voted 18-12 to accept Lautenberg's proposal to make Obama's pro-abortion decision permanent. If the bill becomes law with his provision attached, a pro-life president would not be able to reinstate the Mexico City Policy and protect taxpayers from funding abortions and abortion promotion. Congress would have to go back and pass a bill repealing the Lautenberg provision and a president would have to sign that bill into law.

The Senate State, Foreign Operations Appropriations bill also has another concern for pro-life advocates. The legislation funnels millions more taxpayer dollars to groups like the United Nations Family Planning Fund (UNFPA), which has worked hand-in-hand with the population control officials in China who have enforced the nation's one-child policy with forced abortions and other human rights abuses.


