***Chaplain's Corner***

My Dear Brother Knights:

**Simon Peter Preaching Jesus**  
*The first pope left us all lessons in humble leadership*

In August I would like for our brother knights to meet the figure of Peter: Peter walking on water, Peter proclaiming Jesus as the Messiah and being called the rock and keeper of the keys, and Peter being sharply rebuked for resisting Jesus' prediction of his coming suffering and death.

As a primary witness to Jesus and model for the kind of leadership Jesus wanted for his followers, Simon Peter is a window into the mind of Christ and the meaning of the Gospel, not just for him, but for us.

**The situation in Rome, 64 A.D.**

Night fell over the smoldering remains of the sprawling city. The hills were spared, the villas of senators, the houses of the rich, some official buildings, stark in their marble whiteness above the charred valley where fire had raced through the crowded slums. The huge amphitheater near the forum stood resolute in the haze, its subterranean holding

cells already crowded with suspects rounded up in the fire's aftermath. It had happened quickly — the arrest of subversives, then others picked up after the first waves had been tortured to get more names and the locations of hiding places. The city was in shock, and mobs roamed the streets calling for revenge. Public executions would ensue, served up as entertainment to the crowds, and this would quell the storm. The word on the street was that Nero had planned it all himself. The disaster would give birth to a new, grander city, built on the ruins of the displaced poor, the old markets, brothels, slave quarters, stockyards and vice dens. More civic shrines, parks and spacious promenades would appear, befitting the imperial capital and its far-sighted divine leader. Simon Peter sat on the stone bench in his cell looking at his hands. They were large and worn, and sometimes he imagined he could still smell fish on them or feel the sting of the rope across his palms from his fishing days. That was decades ago, but the memories were strong: of his home in Bethsaida on the lake, his wife and children, the boats coming in after a night on the water, the nets either empty or thrashing with fish.

He had been awake through the night, praying silently, listening to the other prisoners in adjoining cells, many weeping out of fear, others offering encouragement, even leading the rest in familiar hymns. *Put on the mind of Christ Who did not cling to privilege But emptied himself Accepting death, Even death on a cross.* Simon Peter knew that he was going to die in the morning. He would be crucified, singled out as a high-value prisoner, a leader of the outlawed sect. He might have slipped by as just another old man, but someone had pointed him out to gain favor with the interrogators, who rewarded betrayal as an effective way to break the solidarity of fanatical groups, ever present in the shadows of the city, their strange beliefs and ritual abominations a threat to public order.

Simon Peter felt a deep, almost anticlimactic sense of relief. It would soon be over. His long life and labors spanned worlds and, it seemed, several lifetimes, beginning in Galilee, grounded in his intense and seamless Jewish faith, then exploding into the larger, diverse cultures in Antioch, expanding even further during the missionary years across Asia Minor, the cities of Greece and onto the Roman peninsula.

Despite their early quarrels, Paul of Tarsus had been right. There was no containing the universal mystery of Jesus within the cult of Mother Jerusalem. The hunger for meaning in a crumbling world was so great it had devoured the gospel of life they preached. The memory of Jesus, snuffed out on Calvary, had come alive again, an unstoppable message of hope to both Jews and gentiles, giving birth to communities of joy and love wherever they stopped to break open the scriptures and share the sign of Jesus' self-emptying gift in the bread and the cup. The face of Jesus had been imprinted on Simon Peter's face. Their last searing encounter on the beach at the Sea of Tiberias had been his moment of healing and his commissioning as an apostle. It was this look of love that had sustained him over the years.

After all he had done to destroy his first call, the night his courage had failed, his loyalty dissolved in a smoky courtyard outside the Sanhedrin, his flight from Golgotha, his sorrow to the point of despair — despite all this, Jesus had come back from the dead to find him and offer him another chance. His very failure somehow became his credential as foremost preacher of God's limitless mercy. What had broken him open to the core had made room for an equal measure of grace. His tears had been a baptism deep enough to test the foundation of faith for the church itself. From stumbling block to cornerstone, Simon Peter had lived the gospel he would announce to others. This was why Jesus had appointed him leader. They would see in his face the same look of love

Jesus had shown him and know that he was telling the truth. “Don’t be afraid. God’s love has pursued you even in your sin, found you and given you new life.” As dawn broke, Simon Peter could hear the soldiers bringing out the prisoners and assembling them in long lines crowded into the corridors below the arena. The first of these, both men and women, shackled at the waist, hands and ankles, shuffled by Peter’s cell. They slowed to gaze at him, and when someone recognized him, the word passed quickly through the ranks. “Simon Peter is with us,” they said, and the news seemed to put new heart into them.

Simon Peter watched as the church he helped form by his preaching moved slowly past the bars of his cell. They were somehow drawing strength from him. He wanted to speak, but no words came. Something far more eloquent was about to take place. Their blood would be the seed of conversion, and the Christian community would grow because of their martyrdom. He was certain of that. So certain, he found his thoughts turning to the future when the greatest danger the church would face would not be persecution but success. Both the scriptures and Greek storytellers had it right: Adversity builds character, but if you really want to know what people are like, give them power. When the witness of these first martyrs had propelled Jesus’ message of love into the Roman world and beyond, would future church leaders know what to do with the power they exercised over the faithful? Would they lord it over them, as Jesus had warned his disciples to avoid at all cost? Power was the subtlest yet greatest threat to the gospel. “I have come to serve, not to be served. If you want to lead, be the servant of all, for the first will be the last and the last first.”

Soldiers were at the door of his cell. A rough wooden cross already lay on the blood-soaked sand of the arena, where the first group of the Christians had been struck down by javelins and dispatched with swords while the crowd roared its approval. The rich and powerful citizens of Rome were in their private balconies above the steaming, crowded masses.

The top-down hierarchies of master and slave, wealth and poverty, whip and welt, were securely in place. Simon Peter thought about the humility Jesus had shown, the Beloved Son accepting the death of a slave, teaching, always teaching, right up to the last moment. The urge to seek glory, even in death, is strong, he thought. How can I imitate the Master and leave a final lesson about the kind of leader he taught me to be? He approached the cross, knelt and stretched his body on it upside down, facing the imperial box.

This is a great place for those of you receiving our News Letter out of state to get involved. You can visit the secure site, make your contribution and receive your ticket. Isn't this great? No One has an excuse for not doing their part!

Once again, for those of you unfamiliar with the Sweepstake, let me explain. FootballMania is an exciting opportunity for participants because each ticket holder has an equal chance of winning. There's no need to be a football guru...Each ticket contains 3 random teams in each week of the 17 week season. That's a different set of teams each week. ### ***Invitation to Pray With Fellow Brothers and Their Families***





The highlights of the Business Meeting of **July 13<sup>th</sup>** were as follows: (29 members)

The following motions were presented to and voted upon by the Council during this Business Meeting:

A motion was made by Gregg Buckalew to pay the vouchers waiting to be paid by the Council. Kevin Cunnion seconded the motion and it passed by a unanimous voice vote.

1. Tom DeLalla made the second reading of the motion for the Council to spend up to \$3,000.00 to be spent throughout the next Columbian Year, for dinners for the PTSD ward at Lyons Hospital. The motion was seconded by Lou Isidori and it passed by a unanimous voice vote.

2. The second reading of the motion for a proposed By-Law change was made by John Mania and if passed would become effective in October 2011. This change was deemed necessary by the officers due to the conflicting times with the St. Jude Parish CCD Program and our business meeting during the period of October through May. The amendment will read as follows: Section 1. Regular meetings of the Council shall be held on the second and fourth Monday of each month. The first meeting each month shall be a regular business meeting. The second meeting each month shall be the Officers Meeting. 
