Chaplain's Corner

My Dear Brother Knights:

Christ and Controversy

A common saying, repeated by one generation after the other, advises: "Two topics that should be avoided at all costs in polite company are religion and politics."

Recently, I came across similar advice regarding 10 topics that people should not broach while they are blogging or chatting on the Internet. These 10 hot-button issues are: the Middle East, homosexuality, Jesus Christ, race relations, abortion, gun control, the Holocaust, the origins of humankind, politics, and religion. Because most of us hold very strong opinions on these issues, many think it is just better not to bring them up rather than have to deal with the controversy created by conflicting ideologies.

Jesus, however, would never avoid a particular issue just to keep the peace or to make the Gospel more palatable. No topic was off-limits to him, no issue too incendiary to tackle. Jesus was motivated by a desire to make known the truth and goodness of God's will and God's ways. He would engage anyone in the process that was intended to bring them nearer to God. He was willing to step on toes and puncture inflated egos, and he was also gentle with those who felt they no longer mattered or figured into God's all inclusive saving plan. His actions spoke as eloquently as his words; neither ever contradicted the other.

Jesus' authenticity and his courage in confrontation are clear this month as he deals with five specific issues that continue to challenge all who call themselves his disciples. The Matthean Jesus' parable of the wicked tenants and the vineyard (Oct. 2) reminds disciples that each of us is like a tenant farmer or a steward who has been entrusted with the upkeep of God's vineyard, i.e., with the care of this earth and one another. One day, each of us will be asked to render an account of ourselves and our responsibility for all that God has given us. Will we, like the tenant farmers in the parable, shoot the messengers who were sent to guide our way and reject the One who sent them? Jesus will leave that question hanging in the air awaiting our consideration and, if need be, our repentance and conversion.

With the parable of the banquet and the guests who made excuses for themselves (Oct. 9), the Matthean Jesus will broach the issue of entitlement. This parable was addressed to the righteous who believed they had long-standing reservations in God's kingdom. Here, Jesus held forth the truth that the bad and the good, whom the Lord will summon from the streets and the main roads, will have the same opportunity to enter the kingdom. Although those who gloried in their own goodness took Jesus' words as an insult, those humble enough to recognize and admit their sinfulness could welcome the hope they held.

Never one to shy away from a chance to speak the truth, Jesus also allowed himself to become embroiled in the perennial debate over taxes (Oct. 16). In Jesus' day, as today, taxes were a burden that weighed heavily on those who struggled to scrape by; the high number of these taxes fomented deep animosity against Rome and the emperor. Jesus raised the argument to a higher level by asking his listeners to consider not only the debt imposed by Caesar but their greater indebtedness to God. While Caesar could be satisfied with money or material goods, the debt we owe to God costs everything we are and will ever be. On Oct. 23, a legal scholar will test Jesus by asking his opinion about the greatest law. Jesus' response will draw on two familiar texts from the Torah: Love God (Deut 6:5) and Love your neighbor as yourself (Lev 19:18). No one would have argued differently. But when Jesus insisted that the two laws were interdependent, the challenge proved too much for some of his contemporaries who had become adept at manipulating the law to their own ends. On Oct. 30, Jesus tackles the ever-present challenge of authenticity, or the integration of one's *professed* faith with one's *lived* faith. As Jesus' challenges are repeated in our hearing, it will become the responsibility of preachers and parishioners alike to linger over the texts.

Walter Brueggemann suggests that such lingering allows the texts to erupt into new usage (*Texts That Linger, Words That Explode*, Fortress Press, Minneapolis: 2000). Jesus' words seize upon us as we seize upon them, and in the moment we hear them again, our present reality is freshly illuminated and we are transformed. We read the Gospels of October not as mere history or tradition but as a real and present challenge to the quality of our commitment, the clarity of our character and the honesty of our love. Speak, Lord. Your disciples will not shrink from the challenge.

A Gift of Unique and Lasting Value

Permanent life insurance certainly isn't a flashy gift. 


