Grand Knight's Report

Brothers,

Praying the Mass: The Introductory Rites

Catholics commonly speak of the “changes” in the Mass after Vatican II. The truth is that these changes were actually restorations of some of our oldest traditions.

The biggest “change” is a change in attitude about the Mass and our role in it. No longer can we talk as though the priest were “saying” the Mass while we “attend.” The General Instruction of the Roman Missal says that in the Eucharistic Prayer the entire congregation joins itself to Christ in acknowledging the great things God has done and in offering the sacrifice.

Picture a college dorm with music rooms in the basement. Students can go to individual practice rooms with their trumpet or guitar and play away without affecting each other. Compare that to orchestra members who bring their instruments to play the same song together. That’s the difference.

The Introductory Rites of the Mass (from the entrance procession to the Gathering Prayer) help us become an “orchestra.” The purpose of these rites is so that the faithful coming together take on the form of a community.

How do we “pray” this part of the Mass? By remembering that we’re in this together. The next time you are at Mass, focus for a few minutes on the people who are gathered there. Here we are, the Lord’s own disciples in the year 2012, as diverse as Peter, Thomas, Mary Magdalene, as imperfect as they were, yet called by name, sharing “one Lord, one faith, one baptism.”

Try it the next time at Mass. It can be an eye-opening experience to be consciously aware of this diversity, yet our unity in faith. Attitude-changing, in fact.

Chaplain’s Corner

My Dear Brother Knights,

Put Away the Books and Listen

Now that some of the words of the Mass have been changed, people in my parish are reading from the handouts we were issued on the First Sunday of Advent. The changes are marked in red, working as a kind of stop sign for the phrases such as “And also with you” that still trip so familiarly off the tongue. And as a yellow “Proceed with caution” sign for those words like “consubstantial” that people bump up against, hard. Parishioners pause, look down at the card, shake their heads and try to catch up: “... And with your spirit.” “... Through him all things were made.”

Some men and women are bringing their missals once again. A former Anglican in our parish, who joined the Roman rite a few years ago, says it feels, well, “right and just” to have a missal back in his hands during the liturgy. He grew up reading the service. I was thinking of the widespread return of the missal when we buried a longtime member of our parish last February. Mike served in many different leadership positions over the years, but he always took his turn as a lector. He proclaimed the word at Mass.

Most of our lectors read the word, but Mike proclaimed it. I don't mean that he was theatrical or mannered. I mean to use the definition of the transitive verb "proclaimed," in that he "declared a thing publicly," in that he "showed the thing as what it is." Mike made the decision long before I met him. He made the decision to memorize every scripture he was asked to proclaim. By the time he died, at age 66, he knew large portions of scripture by heart, including all of the texts from the Easter Vigil. It is life changing to become a book, to carry its rhythms, its words, around with you, in you. You become the book and the book becomes you, alive, moving.

The Lectionary is more than a document. It is a word, about the Word. The Word is what was in the beginning, alive before anything was. The Word is what God spoke, the breath of God going out to bring order out of chaos, to divide light from darkness and water from dry land. The Word is inseparable from the speaker, just as breath, that power sending words into the world, is inseparable from the one who breathes.

God didn't read the universe into being. God spoke it, spoke the animals, and spoke us, into being. God proclaimed creation, showing the thing as what it is, the work, and gift, of God. As long as we can confine the Word to a printed page, a bound book, we can, quite literally, shelve it. We can put it away in the reference section or file it with the other "B's" or do whatever we must to ignore, and so tame, its power.

But to sit still and listen, to listen as a human voice fills a space, is to have a glimpse of the power of a word to transform a space. I remember Mike's willingness to stand quietly as the assembly quieted in response. First the coughs and the rustlings and the sounds of coats sloughed off and arranged in pews, then the settling in response to the stillness from the ambo. Quiet draws quiet, eyes turn, up, away from the envelopes and bulletins, away from the teenager slumped at your side. We are all drawn to one place and to one voice and we hear, "A reading from the Book of the Prophet Isaiah." If I am reading along, I may read more slowly or more quickly. My eye may be caught by another reading or by the responsorial psalm. But to follow that one voice speaking, as one ear hearing, is to witness a crowd become an assembly.

Reading, that delight and balm, is a solitary act. Proclamation, to use another definition of the word, is a public announcement. The Lord says to Jeremiah, Stand at the gate of the Lord's house and there make your proclamation: Listen to the words of the Lord, all you people of Judah who come in through these gates to worship him. (Jeremiah 7:2-3a) The Lord directs Jeremiah to a public place. The Lord directs Jeremiah to make a declaration to all the Judeans coming to the temple for liturgy. Jeremiah is not directed to hand out leaflets or scrolls or to post a sign. It is his voice that God will use to summon believers and call them to repentance. Jeremiah is told to proclaim. Lectors can lead us. They can take Mike's example and proclaim God's word. They can do it with such authority that we, unbidden, put away our books and listen.

2012 Scholarship Winners

On Monday night June 14th Council 6100 awarded scholarships to 6 high school students at the Senior Awards Ceremony held at the Mount Olive HS Performing Arts Center. All recipients were from Mount Olive HS. Our Grand Knight John Mania was not able to present the council scholarships this year since the Senior Awards night was moved to Monday which put it in conflict with our June business meeting and officer elections. The four Council 6100 scholarships were presented by Scholarship Committee Chair Tom DeLalla and were awarded to:

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The Council scholarship committee received a total of 28 applications this year, 27 from Mt. Olive and 1 from Pope John. The 28 applications tied with the number we received last year as the highest total over the past 11 years. Typically our average has been running around 22 per year.

The scholarship committee, Jim Sweeney, Dave Rose, Lenny Martin and John Mania, under the direction of committee chair Tom DeLalla, reviewed all Council 6100 applications and selected the winners based on the highest appraisals across all 5 categories: Scholastic Achievement, Church/Religious Institution activities, Community activities, Extra Curricular activities and Essay. As in all previous years, to remove any bias in the selection process, all applications are submitted to and reviewed by the committee with the applicants identity removed.

Each committee member independently reviews and scores each application on a point system. The top 4 scores from each committee member are revealed at the selection meeting. Our process has proven to be an extremely efficient and effective way to reach consensus in selecting the winners. Even though we have different committee members from time to time the results year after year using this process have been consistent across the board for selecting the winners.

The Thomas Christopher DeLalla Memorial Scholarship, in its 8th year, was awarded to the candidate who best met the scholarship criteria for accomplishment, commitment, dedication, and leadership in activities and organizations to benefit others, the community and the youth of Mount Olive Township. The winner was selected from a pool of 19 applicants which is the same number as last year.

This is the 6th year the Ernie DiCicco Sr. scholarship was awarded and presented in the amount of \$4,000 (\$1,000/yr for 4 years). The winner was chosen by the DiCicco family from a pool of 22 applicants, the highest total received over the 6 year period. The

selection was made based on overall participation in church, community and school activities in addition to a 500 word essay. Funding for this scholarship is provided through contributions to the Council 6100 Scholarship Fund specifically made in memory of Ernie DiCicco Sr. This \$1,000/year scholarship will be renewed annually for up to 4 years providing student maintains a B average and is a full time student.




