## **Grand Knight's Report**

Brothers,

### Choosing the Sunday Readings

In 1963, as a result of recommendations by the Second Vatican Council, the Catholic Church decided to increase the number of readings at Sunday Mass. But who would choose which texts were to be used?

The task fell to the Consilium for the Implementation of the Constitution on the Sacred Liturgy, a group of churchmen selected by Pope Paul VI to implement the liturgical reforms. The group included Cardinal Giacomo Lercaro, Fr. Cipriano Vagaggini, OSB and Fr. Frederick McManus (sacraments); Msgr. Johannes Wagner (art and music); Canon Aime-Georges Martimort (general principles); Fr. Josef Andreras Jungmann, SJ (Mass); Fr. Herman Schmoidt, SJ (Divine Office); Fr. Ansgar Dirks, OP (liturgical year and sacred furnishings); Msgr. Emmanuel Bonet (liturgical law).

Heading up the consilium was Vincentian Fr. Annibale Bugnini. A former professor of liturgy at the Lateran University, Fr. Bugnini had been the secretary of the Pontifical Preparatory Commission for the Liturgy. That commission's document on liturgical reform later became the basis for the *Constitution on the Sacred Liturgy*.

On May 5, 1969, the consilium became the Congregation for Divine Worship, and Fr. Bugnini was appointed its secretary. He was later ordained a bishop in 1972. On January 4, 1976, Bishop Bugnini was appointed Apostolic Pro-Nuncio to Iran, a post he held until his death in 1982.

The new Lectionary went into effect in the United States on Palm Sunday, March 22, 1970.

### ***Chaplain's Corner***

My Dear Brother Knights,

#### **Words We Need to Hear** **Preaching About the Elephant in the Living Room** **By Gabe Huck**

I was blessed to know two homilists who accepted the challenge and burden of preaching. One of them, Father Gerard Sloyan, is still preaching. The other, Fr. Robert Hovda, died 20 years ago. Both exemplified what is often (too simply) called "preaching with the scriptures in one hand and today's newspaper in the other." Both presumed that preaching required reading, study, depth, breadth. Both prepared every word because they knew from experience that words matter and that words come only with hard labor. Both understood that for Catholics, the homily exists within a deed being done by an assembly, and so approached their task as members of that assembly; in challenging the assembly, they challenged themselves. Neither was a "friendly Father Jack" type, as in: "Know what happened to me on the way over to church this morning?" Neither presumed omniscience or expected to have the last word. Neither saw anything in common between the homilist and the talk show host or between the homilist and the anchorperson. Or, for that matter, between the homilist and, say, Fulton Sheen or Pat Robertson.

I am thinking about them not because I can tell you how to be like them, but because I have something to raise here and somehow thoughts of those two are with me as I try to do this. The elephant of the title above is Israel/Palestine. The living room of the title means the living rooms of our own homes. This too-often-used expression about the elephant is too often used because it so often fits. As it does here. I take it that 99 of 100 sermons in the United States that refer to Israel/Palestine are given by Christian Zionists, fundamentalist and evangelical Protestants who believe that the founding and flourishing of a Jewish national state is part of the final act of history (a la the Book of Revelation), and when the curtain falls, it's all over. These Christians are part of the most powerful single-issue politics in the United States. That issue is our nation's unquestioning support for and unending funding of the fourth greatest military power on earth: Israel. What about the absence of this matter from the preaching of us non-Zionist Christians

(mainline Protestant and Catholic churches)? Why do we seem to find nothing here to put into words when the scriptures are read and the bread broken and the cup shared among American Christians?

Do we passively accept the U.S.-Israel alliance and the lifelong lack of peace in Israel/Palestine? Do we see all of this as “just” a political matter, nothing like, say, the matters of justice in Latin America that had us paying attention a generation ago? Are we afraid that a critical word might sound like anti-Semitism? Is it one more topic where we feel unqualified (and unready to become qualified)? Of course the Christian Zionists alone cannot be credited with putting this particular elephant in the living room. They may be waiting for Armageddon, but their day-by-day allies are those other political and economic players who help bring 80 to 90 percent of the U.S. Congress to support any pro-Israel resolution, a foolishness not lavished on other nations. Such resolutions are then backed up with billions in dollars and arms. So there are various agendas, some corporate, some political. Together they must be credited with making this U.S./Israel alliance seem a work of nature, not to be questioned or tampered with by mere mortals. And so we don’t. And on it goes, perhaps until it collapses from the heavy burden of one too many lies. This was all brought home to me in April and May of this year when I proposed that our eight Iraqi students here in Damascus have four weekly two-hour meetings called “Understanding Palestine.” We did this, and it grew from four to eight meetings with much homework in reading and preparing presentations. For me, this was a long-delayed occasion to go much further than I ever had into exploring this story that’s been weaving its way through all the 70 years of my life. Amazingly, given its decades of headlines, this story has a rather small cast, and it is played out on a stage whose northern border is but a two-hour drive from where I sit now in Damascus.

In the course of preparing these sessions, I became more aware through reading and study than I ever have been of the reality of the Israeli-Palestinian situation. That reality is, of course, exactly why AIPAC (American Israel Political Affairs Committee), perhaps the most powerful lobby in the United States, is needed. That reality is why AIPAC and other well funded organizations have become accomplished manipulators of the media in the United States so that we see and hear a story different from that being seen and heard in the rest of the world. Israel needs only one friend. That’s us. Israel’s leaders of late are so confident of that friend that one Israeli critic of his government titled a recent essay: “Who’s the Tail? Who’s the Dog?” Some would argue that the bond between the two nations is this: Each was established through what has been called, since the 1990s, ethnic cleansing and its subsequent denial. The fate of the native peoples in what became the United States is echoed in the fate of the Palestinians, Christian and Muslim Arabs who were the indigenous people of Palestine. Palestine was never “a land without people for a people without a land,” as the Zionist slogan goes. It had been inhabited for thousands of years. Maps from 100 years ago show Palestine, then part of the Ottoman Empire, filled with towns and villages. Zionist leaders knew they could not import a majority of European Jews, so a land with a Jewish majority would have to be created by other means. Israeli historians now freely tell the story of the “transfer” plans, the cleansing of Palestine in 1948 of its native people, most of them to be refugees until now, to the third generation. The camps of 1948 and 1967 in neighboring countries slowly became slightly more permanent housing, but citizenship in those countries was never an option for most of them. Theirs was mostly an urban fate, but in so many other ways not unlike our “reservations” for Native Americans. These long-denied stories of the removal of the owners of the land and the destruction of hundreds of their villages are now for all to read. It’s in the archives. (The best treatment of this I know is by the Israeli historian Ilan Pappé: *The Ethnic Cleansing of Palestine*, One world Publications,

2006.) But archives are archives and what endure are images, and the images circulated about Israel were as well-done as they were one-sided. For me, the images come from such moving stories as best-selling novel and blockbuster movie *Exodus*, and from Anne Frank: *The Diary of a Young Girl*. This was what we came to think Israel was: a valiant nation of survivors who made the desert bloom while fighting off the Arab armies that vastly outnumbered the newcomers. These consciously created images hid from us the reality. And they still do. The “peace process” is an image we have lived with for 45 years, since Israel seized the West Bank and Gaza, the 45 years of an occupation where international law and U.N. resolutions are meaningless as the ethnic cleansing continues between Israel and its Palestinian “partners.” It continues with our tacit agreement that Israel’s long supporter, the United States, should somehow be host and mediator of the process. It continues because it is not a peace process at all, but the ever-more-effective illegal settling of the West Bank by Israelis until there will be little left to be what can be called Palestine.

A nation of 6 million people, helped by \$5 or 6 billion of U.S. military and other aid each year, threatens to do to Iran now what it did to Iraq and to Syria in past years: take matters into its own hands, a sort of vigilante action, and bomb another nation. The senior partner may not allow it yet, but it can be talked about without fear because the United States and Israel cannot be held accountable — unlike lesser nations. Israel, the only nuclear power in the Middle East, wants to stay that way. Israel allows no U.N. inspections of its nuclear weapons, makes no pledges not to use them. The larger questions here have to do with the rule of law, the authority of the bare-bones international law that’s come to be. But when the world’s most powerful nation takes international law when it wishes and ignores it when it wishes, why wonder that Israel does the same? Why are we not amazed that this sort of issue, where so much information and a whole body of church thought exists, is so seldom preached? Every passing year that it is not preached, we make the truth and any just remedy harder to recover. Over and over commentators marvel that there is more criticism of all this among an admittedly small portion of Israel’s own population than there is in the United States. Of course such criticism is there for those who want to search it out. And there is a growing movement to bring the injustices to light and to end them. This movement in the United States is based in part on the “boycott, divestment, sanctions” method ([www.bdsmovement.net](http://www.bdsmovement.net)) that helped end apartheid in South Africa. And all of this is timely. With the dramatic changes brought to Egypt and to Tunisia especially, still unsettled in several other nations, the role the United States plays there can be rethought. But from what perspective? Who will raise the questions? World opinion has been helpless to change U.S. policy. That leaves us, the church, to be the voice of change. Where then does the homilist enter all this? It is so complicated! And it is one issue among so many where injustice reigns. Yes, it is complicated; yes, there are myriad other situations calling out for the concern and action of our communities — but at least in raising this, you, the homilist, are not being partisan because there’s no political party that would dare even to discuss the “special friendship” from a moral perspective. While the truth of what I have been discussing is evident to those who seek it, the deception is so large, so overwhelming, so well done, that we find it hard to imagine another story. We watched the PBS series “Eyes on the Prize” here with our Iraqi students, 14 one-hour episodes covering the civil rights movement in the United States from 1955 to the 1970s. One line that comes up again and again from them: “Injustice anywhere is a threat to justice everywhere” (Martin Luther King, in his “Letter from Birmingham Jail”). Is that line true? Does it have meaning to those who assemble to do liturgy in churches Sunday by Sunday? If these words can so strike young Iraqis, who have been through their share and more of injustice, why does it seem so hard to hear in our Sunday assemblies? What

stories are the homilists learning that must be told? Where is the energy to read and study and sweat out the homilies that both Sunday scriptures and Sunday ritual deeds not only support but demand of us? As with so many life-and-death situations today, the study/judge/act process so familiar just a few Catholic generations ago could begin to do what it did in pre-Vatican II days: to put responsibility and accountability in the hands of the baptized. The homilist is there to invite, give example, energize, and let us know we can rise above the present ecclesial depression and seek Gospel living in the larger world.

**Note:** Council 6100 will pay cost for first 10 members to sign up.



**This is one of the very best emails I have EVER received where it gently explains the difference in thinking between people with opposite outlooks.**


