My Dear Brother Knights,

New Year's Resolutions for Renewal

Anniversaries look back, resolutions look forward. We give our lives continuity by identifying our values and projecting them as goals that measure our good intentions, laying out a kind of map for our self-improvement. The gap between the real and the ideal can be discouraging, but the slow progress we make over time is called life. We do our best; we stop to celebrate, forgive, renew, go forward. January is named for the Roman god Janus, a doorkeeper with two faces, one looking back and the other forward. It's an appropriate threshold for the global rituals of taking stock and making resolutions. What we do culturally is also a useful exercise for us as local churches. Asking the members of a parish to submit New Year's resolutions might reveal a great deal about how a community perceives itself. Predictably, some will find faults to correct, others hopes to be nurtured, but each resolution is likely to express the ideals everyone holds collectively, the kind of church we want to be and are committed to becoming. The extended anniversaries marking 50 years since the

momentous events of the Second Vatican Council (1962-1965) will occasion a chance to reflect on the meaning of the council for the church today at every level.

The council's four sessions produced 16 documents: four constitutions, nine decrees and three declarations. Actually reading and studying the documents is indispensable. The more modest focus of this article is that there is much to be mined in considering the way the council was conducted as a model for how we can be church today. Here are five resolutions based on Vatican II and in particular on the example set by Pope John XXIII. Our church is a joyful mother. The very first words of Vatican II are the title of John XXIII's opening address on October 11, 1962, *Gaudet Mater Ecclesia* — "Mother Church Rejoices." It was a perfect keynote for John's desire that the church recover the joy of the Gospel as the source of its inner life, and his conviction that the church should offer a maternal face to the world. Church doctrine was not in question; what the church needed was, in John's words, "the medicine of mercy." Vatican II was to be a pastoral council, and what better way to express this than to project the church as the mother of a family? Good Pope John, so devoted to his peasant family in Bergamo, no doubt had in mind the unconditional love a mother gives while a proud father thinks only a stern look will correct a prodigal child.

What do people see first when they approach our parish church? What impression do they get when attending Sunday Mass, reading the bulletin, visiting the website? How accessible are church offices and services? How are the gifts of women evident in the ministries of this pastoral, domestic mother church? We resolve to be a joyful, welcoming mother church. First, we pray. When Pope John first spoke of convening a council to his inner circle of Roman cardinals, the idea was met with skepticism and silence. Old hands like Cardinal Alfredo Ottaviani, head of the Vatican's Holy Office, distrusted any plan to invite the world's bishops to Rome and open up what he saw as settled questions of doctrine and mission beyond their competence. One strategy either to shorten or stall the council was to overwhelm it with drafts. Preparatory commissions hastily sent over 70 schemas on every subject for the bishops to study. But among them was a draft on the liturgy that was the fruit of over a century of development within the pastoral liturgical movement, based on an even deeper revival of the study of the Bible, the church fathers and the history of worship.

When the council met, most of the schemas were judged unsuitable, but the one on the liturgy was ready to go. It was the first up for debate, and this meant that the image of church as the "body of Christ" supplanted the more hierarchical and juridical image of the church as a "perfect society" that came from the Council of Trent. The Pauline metaphor became the starting point for debate in other documents on the nature of the church. Instead of discussing the church as an organization, the council fathers took up the mystery of the church as the incorporation of all the baptized into the Paschal Mystery, the font and summit of worship. To be a Catholic is not just about obeying rules but about living and growing in intimate union with Christ by sharing his life, death and

resurrection.

We have only begun to plumb the depths of this mystery, but suffice it to say that worship and catechesis here open us to develop in grace and freedom toward full Christian maturity. This, before all else, is why our local churches exist, why people come and what they seek over and above organizational involvement or benefit. We resolve to invest in the quality of our worship in the coming year as the primary source of our Christian formation. We listen to the Holy Spirit The source of the council was, in John XXIII's own words, a "flash of light" from the Holy Spirit that came to him as he reflected on the needs of the church. The suddenness of this inspiration does not preclude the obvious truth that John had long prayed about the need to free the church from a fortress mentality that had been built up over four centuries since the Council of Trent convened in 1545 to defend the church against the Protestant Reformation. Trent's anathemas had extended to the Age of Enlightenment, the rise of secular movements, modern culture and science.

The result was a church militant set against the world, stern on the outside and, for many Catholics, suffocating within. Pope John, after a long career that was largely pastoral and outside Roman inner circles, saw the council as a way to open up the church to dialogue with modern thought, culture and religion. As complex and as controversial as this was, this is what the council did, and it made the church a living, dynamic staging area after centuries of stagnant, closed certitude. Without openness, we cannot learn. A parish must ask how it can be more open, breathing in the mysterious but always life-giving Spirit, especially where some say "this is how we've always done it" even if it doesn't work. Vatican II asked, what are the signs of the times confronting the church? To stay relevant and vital, we must do the same. We resolve to trust the Holy Spirit to guide us to full engagement with the world around us. Unity makes diversity possible Pope John knew that the council would bring together opposing groups. He entrusted preparations for the council to the Roman curia led by Cardinal Ottaviani, the quintessential guardian of the legacy of Trent. When the council convened, John also knew that more progressive bishops led by Cardinals Leo Joseph Suenens, Josef Frings, Achille Liénart and Giovanni Batista Montini (soon to be Pope Paul VI) would challenge the curialists. Each session of the council opened with Mass and with the enthronement of the Gospels. This backdrop of unity witnessed many fierce debates. Strong majority and minority voices emerged as the approximately 2,500 bishops at Vatican II met for a total of 168 general sessions to hammer out the texts that defined the church's identity and mission.

Not surprisingly, there was lots of maneuvering, arm-twisting, evasion, delay and confusion typical of any deliberative body. While the process was limited and often subjected to papal interventions, the bishops experienced their own authority in communion with the pope in ways that opened up for future development the idea of greater collegiality within the church at every level. Synods, regional and national conferences of bishops, diocesan and parish councils and a spirit of consultation flowed from Vatican II. Changes in

governance affirmed what the document on the liturgy called “fully conscious, and active participation” by all the faithful in the life of the church. What can this mean for us as local churches? Again, united by essentials like word and Eucharist and open to the reality that diversity is the norm and not the exception in life, we resolve to get any issues on the table that divide or debilitate our life together. If peace at any price has been the resolution we make each year, this year we resolve to welcome and address openly our diversity.

Renewal is a work in progress. The story is told that when Pope John went to bed each night he turned the church over to God, saying, “It’s your church, Lord. You watch over it.” That prayer revealed John’s abiding confidence that despite the many conflicts and problems facing the church, all would be well. His attitude was the opposite of those he chided in his October 11 opening address as “prophets of gloom,” who see “nothing but prevarication and ruin. They say that our era, in comparison with past eras, is getting worse, and they behave as though they had learned nothing from history, which is, nonetheless, the teacher of life.”

Fear weakens faith and our ability to tackle real problems in a timely and effective manner. The reform and renewal of the church is a work in progress. Others laid the foundations, and it is now our turn to take the treasures of the Gospel and apply them to our time and place. The long view of history reveals that it is not the warriors or propagandists who build community but those who work steadily for the good of all.

If we believe that God watches over the church, we can exercise patience and civility, the very values that foster growth. We resolve to stay in this for the long haul. Whether New Year’s resolutions are personal promises or the goals and objectives of a whole community, they serve to remind us who we are and what we want to achieve. Vatican II may seem a distant memory, but its principles are graces given for building up the church that will not cease to guide and inspire us until they are realized. The new year is our chance to recommit ourselves to be part of that vision and effort.

March on Washington

Thousands of anti-abortion demonstrators from around the country marched in Washington to protest the 40th anniversary of the landmark decision that legalized abortion, Roe v. Wade. They marched on the

Supreme Court on Friday protesting the landmark ruling establishing a constitutional right to abortion, and cheered on speakers who vowed to work for more restrictions.

Though some in the crowd were veterans of previous marches held annually since *Roe v. Wade* was decided in 1973, the majority seemed to be teenagers and young adults, many of whom carried signs identifying themselves as part of a “pro-life generation.”

Buses from around the country, mostly chartered by Catholic schools and organizations, brought groups of people to the Mall for a pre-march rally in which politicians, religious leaders and activists decried the 55 million abortions they said had been performed since the *Roe v. Wade* decision.

The archbishop of Boston, Cardinal Sean O’Malley, read a message posted early Friday by Pope Benedict XVI from his personal Twitter account: “I join all those marching for life from afar, and pray that political leaders will protect the unborn and promote a culture of life.”

House Speaker John A. Boehner (R-Ohio) appeared on a giant video screen and vowed to work for passage of a bill banning taxpayer funding for abortions. Rep. Diane Black (R-Tenn.) told the crowd that she would fight for a bill she has introduced that would prohibit family planning grants from going to groups that provide abortions, such as Planned Parenthood. Rep. Christopher H. Smith (R-N.J.), chairman of the Congressional Pro-Life Caucus, called President Obama, who has stated his commitment to protecting abortion as a constitutional right, the “abortion president.” “Know this, Mr. President,” Smith said to loud cheers from the crowd of protesters. “We will never quit.”

The March for Life is typically held on Jan. 22, the actual anniversary of *Roe v. Wade*. This year, it was delayed until Friday to allow for cleanup after Monday’s presidential inauguration and make it easier to travel to the District.

Despite a bitter, Arctic cold that descended over the region, Friday’s crowd was large. Police no longer estimate crowd size, so it is difficult to judge how many people attended. The march permit was for 50,000 people, though organizers said the attendance was several times that number. People at the rally were concentrated on the Mall between Seventh and 12th Streets, and the march up Constitution Avenue stretched for at least five blocks.

The most commonly carried posters simply said “Defend Life” or showed a black and white photograph of a newborn infant, plump and healthy-looking. Posters with graphic images of aborted fetuses were rare.

Jeanne Monahan, the new head of the March for Life, said the

movement is making progress in changing laws and attitudes. She noted about 200 pro-life measures introduced in state legislatures, and said Americans are growing more pro-life. "Pro-life is the new normal in the United States," she told the crowd.

Many who participated came in groups, identifiable by the banners they carried or the matching scarves they wore. Chartered buses dropped off people several blocks away, and they approached the Mall on foot, often carrying placards, crosses and flags bearing the name of the college, high school or diocese they represented.

Council 6100 Scholarshp Information **"time sensitive"**

It's not too early to be looking at scholarships for 2013. Information and applications for all scholarships listed below can be obtained on line at our Council 6100 web site <http://www.kofc6100.org> and click on "Scholarship Info" in the home page table. The following summary includes 4 scholarships for HS Seniors entering college in the fall and one, a 4 year scholarship from the Paterson Federation, for students entering a Catholic HS.

Council 6100 Scholarships

- **Recipient:** Students graduating high school
- **Award:** 4 scholarships - \$1500, \$1000, \$500 (2)

- **Qualifications:** All applicants must be a resident of Mount Olive Township or a child of any Council 6100 member and are appraised on 5 categories: Scholastic Achievement, Church/Religious Institution activities, Community activities, Extra Curricular activities and Essay. The essay will describe the applicant's reasons for continuing their education and why a scholarship is important to them.
- **Sponsor:** Knights of Columbus Council 6100
- **Deadline:** April 15th (date specified by the applicants high school may be earlier)

Thomas Christopher DeLalla Memorial Scholarship

- **Recipient:** Student graduating high school
- **Award:** \$1000
- **Qualifications:** All applicants must be a resident of Mount Olive Township or a child of any Council 6100 member and are appraised on dedicated commitment and leadership in organizations or activities to benefit others, the community and the youth of Mount Olive Township. Special consideration will be given for participation and leadership in activities or programs which directly benefit local community youth organizations (e.g. religious organizations, squires, youth group, sports, scouting, other community youth based organizations.). An essay is required describing why a scholarship is important to the applicant and what the applicant did specifically that qualifies him/her as the best candidate to receive this scholarship.
- **Sponsor:** Knights of Columbus Council 6100
- **Deadline:** April 15th (date specified by the applicants high school may be earlier)

Ernie DiCicco Sr. Scholarship

- **Recipient:** Student graduating high school.
- **Award:** \$1000/yr, up to 4 years.
- **Qualifications:** The applicant must be active in church, community and school activities. The first preference is to a parishioner of St. Jude's parish in Budd Lake. A 500 word essay must be written to explain why the student should be considered worthy of this award. The above criteria are main consideration, but this does not rule out other candidates who can show similar involvement. This scholarship can be renewed annually for up to 3 additional years providing the student maintains a B average and remains a full time student
- **Sponsor:** Ernie DiCicco Sr. Scholarship Fund through the Knights of Columbus Council 6100
- **Deadline:** April 15th (date specified by the applicants high school may be earlier)

Different Life Stages, Changing Needs

You may have a long-range expense for which you are saving, such as college for your children. You may be concerned about a comfortable, worry-free retirement. You may want to protect your ability to earn a living. You may wonder if needing costly long-term care will deplete your hard-earned assets. 

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
